Overview of the EPA Brownfields Program

EPA's Brownfields Program empowers states, Tribal Nations, communities, and other stakeholders to work together to prevent, assess, safely clean up, and sustainably reuse brownfield sites. A brownfield site is real property, the expansion, redevelopment, or reuse of which may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant. The Small Business Liability Relief and Brownfields Revitalization Act of 2002, as amended by the Brownfields Utilization, Investment and Local Development Act of 2018, was passed to help states and communities around the country clean up and revitalize brownfield sites. Under this law, EPA provides financial assistance to eligible applicants through five competitive grant programs: Multipurpose Grants, Assessment Grants, Revolving Loan Fund Grants, Cleanup Grants, and Job Training Grants. Additionally, funding support is provided to state and tribal response programs through a separate mechanism.

Assessment Grant

\$2,000,000

EPA has selected the Coeur d'Alene Tribe for a Brownfields Community-wide Assessment Grant for States and Tribes. Community-wide grant funds will be used to conduct nine Phase I and ten Phase II environmental site assessments. Grant funds also will be used to perform four small-scale and one large-scale hazardous building material surveys; develop a GIS-based ranking tool that is tied to the existing site inventory; prepare eight cleanup plans, three site reuse plans, one market study, and one infrastructure analysis; facilitate one public meeting per year; and support other community engagement activities. The target area for this grant includes the cities of Worley and Plummer, as well as the rural communities of Tensed and DeSmet - all located on the Coeur d'Alene Reservation. Priority sites include the 74.4-acre Stimson Lumber Mill in Plummer; the 1.6-acre Supper Club, 0.6-acre Co-op, and 15-acre grain silos in Worley; and the 30-acre Old Missile Site, the 7-acre former Tensed Landfill, and the 2.5-acre Berg Enterprises Building in Tensed and DeSmet.
